Food Bank Embraces Growth, Evercomes Challenges

What a year 2022 was.

It was full of growth, but also brought challenges to the food bank.



The growth was expected: At the beginning of 2022 we announced our expansion with a second location in Cape Girardeau County.

The building was finally ready for staff in December, before opening earlier this year. It has been exciting to see the building transform into a space that will better allow us to serve our neighbors facing hunger. There is a warehouse area, providing much-needed additional storage. and a large volunteer center where our Backpacks for Friday kits will be packed for the 1,200 children the program serves every week during the school year.

Our staff also grew over the last year, as we added programs to better meet the needs of the individuals we serve. (You can read more about those programs on page 5.)

There was another area of growth: Over the course of the year, more people turned to us for food assistance, some for the first time. By the end of 2022, we were serving an average of 80,000 individuals each month. And at pantries and

distributions across southeast Missouri, their stories were very much the same: Rising prices had made it harder for them to make ends meet and put food on the table. Senior citizens on fixed incomes and families who had been living paycheck to paycheck found they could no longer afford the same groceries they could a year ago.

Inflation was also our biggest challenge: It meant the food bank paid more for the food we purchased. At the same time, we received 1 million pounds less through the USDA's TEFAP program, which provides food for low-income families. TEFAP is a critical tool in the fight against hunger, and the food bank is hopeful that Congress will bolster the program in the 2023 Farm Bill.

While I don't know what challenges 2023 will bring, I do know SEMO Food Bank is ready to meet them.

We're focused on building capacity for ourselves and our network of agencies, forging new partnerships and continuing the fight against hunger in southeast Missouri.

2022 by the Numbers



One in six of our neighbors goes hungry. Hunger rates vary across our 16-county service area, with food insecurity as high as 29.5 percent for childhood hunger in the Bootheel.



2,368 volunteers joined us at the food bank last year, contributing 6,179 hours packing and sorting food and helping with office projects.

12,797,729 meals were distributed through our network of 140 food pantries, soup kitchens, shelters, mobile food distributions and other programs.





321 mobile food pantries were held last year, each with enough groceries to feed 200 families.



1,270 students in 30 school districts

are receiving backpacks of food for the weekend through our Backpacks for Friday program. Each pack includes kid-friendly, no-prep foods in pop-top containers.

72 percent of food distributed fell into Feeding America's Foods to Encourage category, which include healthy items

such as fruits, vegetables,

protein and dairy.



2,019,112 pounds of fresh

produce were made available to our neighbors in need because of the generous support of southeast Missouri farmers and gardeners. (See page 6 for a list.)

1,579,160 pounds

of food were distributed through TEFAP (The Emergency Food Assistance Program), a USDA program that serves low-income families.



5,350 CSFP senior

boxes were distributed each month. One in eight seniors in southeast Missouri is food insecure. Commodity Supplemental Food Program boxes, packed by volunteers, provide about 35 pounds of nutritious, shelf-stable USDA food to recipients every month.


1.633 SNAP

applications were completed to link people to an important resource to obtain food on a regular basis. Every \$1 of benefits provided in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (food stamps) generates \$1.70 in economic impact.

More than 2,500

donors contributed to the food bank last year, 496 for the first time, and for that we are incredibly grateful. More than 96 percent of donations the food bank receives are put back into our programs to end hunger in southeast Missouri.

Revenue





Food Bank Opens

Second Location

After a yearlong renovation, Southeast Missouri Food Bank opened its second location late in 2022. Staff began moving into the new space in December, before opening earlier this year.

It was worth the wait.

"We're excited about the expansion and to finally have the building open," said Joey Keys, chief executive officer of SEMO Food Bank. "It is going to allow us to better serve southeast Missouri and our neighbors facing hunger. At the end of last year, we were able to expand some of our programs and resources that will be based out of the Jackson location."

The food bank's Backpacks for Friday kits will be packed by volunteers in Jackson. The program was revamped slightly during summer 2022, with food being packed at the food bank before being distributed to participating schools.

"Having a second volunteer center really opens up what we're able to do," Keys said. "Being able to pack BFF on site gives us more control over the quality of the food we're providing to children."

The warehouse in Jackson will also offer additional storage for disaster-relief items such as bottled water. The food bank is the designated source of food and water in case of a disaster in southeast

Missouri, and needs to maintain an ample supply of both and be ready to coordinate a distribution within a moment's notice.

The food bank will continue to be headquartered at its Sikeston location along Interstate 55.



Expanding Programs Increase

Access to Healthy Foods

Southeast Missouri Food Bank's mission is to end hunger and leverage the power of food to build healthy communities. And while providing regular access to food for families, children, seniors and veterans facing hunger is an important part of that mission, we're also looking for long-term solutions to food insecurity in southeast Missouri.

One of the areas the food bank and its partners is focusing on is increasing access to nutritious food.

"We know access to healthy food is important to overall health," said Joey Keys, chief executive officer of SEMO Food Bank. "We also know that healthier foods like fresh produce and protein often cost the most. The food bank strives to make healthier foods more accessible to the people we serve."

The food bank received a grant late in 2022 to start a USDA prescription produce box program in partnership with SoutheastHEALTH and the John J. Pershing VA Medical Center in Poplar Bluff. When it starts later this year, the program will provide a monthly produce box to participants who are identified and enrolled by one of our healthcare partners.

It will be similar to the food bank's existing Veterans Healthy Food Surplus Program, which provides veterans with nutritious food each month. That program has seen great success, with 88 percent of participants reporting improved health in a 2021 survey.

Southeast Missouri Food Bank was also among 25 food banks nationwide to receive Feeding America's Food Security Equity Impact Fund to address the root causes of hunger and food insecurity in Pemiscot County, which has some of the highest rates of hunger in the state.



In partnership with Faith Temple Complex in Hayti, the food bank will work to advance and develop solutions to improve food insecurity in the community. Funding will support the development of a community garden and the construction of a pavilion for a local farmers market. Both projects aim to improve the community's access to healthy food.

"This can make a long-term, lasting impact in Pemiscot County, giving its residents sustainable access to healthy food," Keys said. "We hope that working with our partners in the community, we can address some of the barriers faced by residents in Pemiscot County."


